HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED

This poll was conducted by Mason-Dixon Polling & Research, Inc. of Washington, D.C. from September 20 through September 22, 2010. A total of 625 registered voters were interviewed statewide by telephone. All stated they were likely to vote in the November general election.

Those interviewed were selected by the random variation of the last four digits of telephone numbers. A cross-section of exchanges was utilized and quotas were assigned to reflect voter turn-out by county.

The margin for error, according to standards customarily used by statisticians, is no more than ±4 percentage points. This means that there is a 95 percent probability that the "true" figure would fall within that range if all voters were surveyed. The margin for error is higher for any subgroup, such as a gender or party grouping.

RUBIO OPENS WIDE LEAD CRIST FADES AS DEMOCRATS MOVE TO MEEK

Republican Marco Rubio has increased his lead over independent Charlie Crist in the race for Florida's U.S. Senate seat, as Democrat Kendrick Meek is increasing his support among Democratic voters.

Statewide, Rubio is now supported by 40% of likely voters (up from 38%), while Crist is backed by 28% (down from 33%) and 23% are for Meek (up from 18%).

Since the primary, there have been some significant shifts in voter support, exclusively to the detriment of Crist. In August, Crist led Meek by 45%-36% among Democrats, but now Meek has moved ahead and holds a 44%-37% advantage with Democratic voters since becoming the party's official nominee.

Additionally, Crist's 44%-31% margin over Rubio among independents has now flipped to a 38%-27% lead for the Republican. Meek has also increased his strength with independents from 13% to 20%.

Crist's support has now dropped 10-points since May, while Rubio and Meek have each made gains. In essence, Crist is bleeding Democrats to Meek and independents to both Meek and Rubio. It is also noteworthy that Crist's statewide support has fallen below the 30% threshold, leaving him far short of the minimum required to win a three-way race under the most perfect circumstances (34%).

Rubio's support has essentially remained steady over the past month, increasing by just 2-points. Still, sitting on 40% in a three-way race is a very strong position to hold. Rubio, in fact, only needs to gain 2-3 points to wrap up the race. At 43%, the only way Rubio could lose is if the support for Crist or Meek dropped under 15%. That could happen, but it would require an almost total abandonment by Democrats from Crist to Meek, or vice-versa.

The past month has seen the two party nominees increase their favorable name recognition. Meek has even been able to drop his negative rating by 10-points (from 37% to 27%) since disposing of Jeff Greene in the Democratic primary.

Conversely, Crist's popularity continues to fall. His favorable rating is now at 35% -- down from 39% in August and 41% in May. It is also at its lowest level in 8 years (since October 2002). Most importantly, Crist's negative rating is 36%, which is 1 point higher than his favorable rating. It is also the highest negative rating ever for Crist in the 13 years he has been polled as a statewide candidate.

Rubio and Meek have generally run positive television advertising to introduce themselves to general election voters. On the other hand, Crist, who is already universally known to these voters, has started his media campaign by going on the attack. That is a pretty clear sign that his campaign is aware that they are in trouble.

Rubio seems to be in a solid position to win, while Crist is fading. Meek is in a tight position. He has an outside chance to pull off a major comeback, but it is largely predicated on his ability to convince Crist's new-found Democratic friends that the former Republican's campaign is hopeless and it is time for them to come back to their party. That will be a tough challenge, but it is now the only apparent way for Rubio to lose.
