



NEW HAMPSHIRE POLL OF LIKELY PRIMARY VOTERS WHO WATCHED IOWA CAUCUS COVERAGE

Interviews conducted by telephone by ORC International on January 3, 2012 with 554 likely Republican primary voters in New Hampshire who watched TV news coverage of the Iowa caucuses on January 3 or followed them via radio, the internet, or another news source. All interviews on January 3 were conducted between 9:23 pm and 10:02 pm. The margin of sampling error for results based on the total sample is plus or minus 4 percentage points.

Survey respondents were first interviewed on December 21-24 and December 26-31, 2011. Questions were asked of each respondent both in the pre-caucuses questionnaire on December 21-31 and on tonight's questionnaire. Results for tonight's respondents from the interviews conducted both before and after the Iowa caucuses are reported.

People who watch new coverage of a live event are typically different from those who don't. Respondents for tonight's poll of Iowa caucus watchers were much older than all likely New Hampshire Republican primary voters (based on the December 21-27 CNN/Time/ORC International poll in New Hampshire), and more likely to describe themselves as Tea Party supporters. 79% of respondents on January 3 were over 50 years old (compared to 56% of all likely primary voters) and 47% of

respondents on January 3 described themselves as Tea Party supporters (compared to 38% of all likely primary voters).
