

Interviews with 1,023 adult Americans conducted IN MICHIGAN by telephone by ORC International on September 14-18, 2012. The margin of sampling error for results based on the total sample is plus or minus 3 percentage points. The Michigan sample also includes 910 interviews among registered voters (plus or minus 3.5 percentage points) and 754 interviews among likely voters (plus or minus 3.5 percentage points). In Michigan, 765 interviews were conducted among landline respondents and 258 interviews among cell phone respondents.

METHODOLOGY

In Michigan, a total of 1,023 adults were interviewed by telephone. All respondents were asked questions concerning basic demographics, and the entire sample was weighted to reflect statewide Census figures for gender, race, age, education and region of the state. Registered voters were asked questions about their likelihood of voting, past voting behavior, and interest in the campaign; based on the answers to those questions, 754 respondents were classified as likely voters. Among those likely voters, 38% described themselves as Democrats, 30% described themselves as Independents, and 32% described themselves as Republicans. Michigan does not have party registration.

In the Michigan crosstabs, the state regions are composed of the following counties: the "Wayne County" region is composed exclusively of Wayne County; the "Oakland/Macomb" region is composed of Oakland and Macomb counties; the "Central" region is composed of Calhoun, Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Ingham, Jackson, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Monroe, Saginaw, St Clair, Shiawassee, and Washtenaw counties; the "Southwest" region is composed of Allegan, Barry, Berrien, Branch, Cass, Hillsdale, Ionia, Kalamazoo, Kent, Ottawa, St Joseph, and Van Buren counties; and the "North/Upper Peninsula" region is composed of Alcona, Alger, Alpena, Antrim, Arenac, Baraga, Bay, Benzie, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Chippewa, Clare, Crawford, Delta, Dickinson, Emmet, Gladwin, Gogebic, Grand Traverse, Gratiot, Houghton, Huron, Iosco, Iron, Isabella, Kalkaska, Keweenaw, Lake, Leelanau, Luce, Mackinac, Manistee, Marquette, Mason, Mecosta, Menominee, Midland, Missaukee, Montcalm, Montmorency, Muskegon, Newaygo, Oceana, Ogemaw, Ontonagon, Osceola, Oscoda, Otsego, Presque Isle, Roscommon, Sanilac, Schoolcraft, Tuscola, and Wexford counties.
