

COLORADO

In Colorado, interviews with 984 adult Americans conducted by telephone by ORC International on October 26-31, 2012. The margin of sampling error for results based on the total sample is plus or minus 3 percentage points. The Colorado sample also includes 904 interviews among registered voters (plus or minus 3.5 percentage points) and 764 interviews among likely voters (plus or minus 3.5 percentage points). In Colorado, 733 interviews were conducted among landline respondents and 251 interviews among cell phone respondents.

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METHODOLOGY

In Colorado, a total of 984 adults were interviewed by telephone. All respondents were asked questions concerning basic demographics, and the entire sample was weighted to reflect statewide Census figures for gender, race, age, education and region of the state. Registered voters were asked questions about their likelihood of voting, past voting behavior, and interest in the campaign; based on the answers to those questions, 764 respondents were classified as likely voters. Among those likely voters, 33% described themselves as registered Democrats, 35% described themselves as registered Independents, and 31% described themselves as registered Republicans.

In the Colorado crosstabs, the state regions are composed of the following counties: the "Denver/Boulder" region is composed of Boulder, and Denver counties; the "Denver Suburbs" region is composed of Adams, Arapahoe, Jefferson, and Broomfield counties; and the "Rest of Colorado" region is composed of Clear Creek, Douglas, Elbert, El Paso, Fremont, Gilpin, Grand, Larimer, Park, Pueblo, Teller, Weld, Alamosa, Archuleta, Baca, Bent, Chaffee, Cheyenne, Conejos, Costilla, Crowley, Custer, Delta, Dolores, Eagle, Garfield, Gunnison, Hinsdale, Huerfano, Jackson, Kiowa, Kit Carson, Lake, La Plata, Las Animas, Lincoln, Logan, Mesa, Mineral, Moffat, Montezuma, Montrose, Morgan, Otero, Ouray, Phillips, Pitkin, Prowers, Rio Blanco, Rio Grande, Routt, Saguache, San Juan, San Miguel, Sedgwick, Summit, Washington, and Yuma counties.

Crosstabs on the following pages only include results for subgroups with enough unweighted cases to produce a sampling error of +/- 8.5 percentage points or less. Some subgroups represent too small a share of the population of Colorado to produce crosstabs with an acceptable sampling error. Interviews were conducted among these subgroups but results for groups with a sampling error larger than +/-8.5 percentage points are not displayed.
